


INCREASING STATE INTERVENTION IN ENGLISH SPEAKING POST-INDUSTRIALISED COUNTRIES

- Canada Investigations 1998 vs 2008:
 Urgent child protection unchanged Chronic doubles
- USA 2011-15 increases: 16.2% referrals; 9.5% investigations; 4.5% substantiations
- Australia 2011-12 to 2015-16 increases:
 40.7% notifications; 41.6% investigations; 26.0% substantiations; 17.2% children in out of home care
- England 2008-16 increases: 15.4% referrals;
 124.3% investigations; 86.2% substantiations;
 18.6% looked after children
- Wales 2008-16 referrals fall 22.7% but increases: 19.95 (to 2015) initial assessments; 48.6% placements on CP register; 22.1% looked after


Cross-UK comparison of rate of looked after children per 10,000 children, 2004-2016






Trends in England Children in Care, with Adoptive Parents or Special Guardians Projections to 2026 based on current level of placements



INVOLVEMENT OF CHILDREN IN CP SYSTEMS IN ENGLISH SPEAKING INDUSTRIALISED COUNTRIES


- USA 37.4% investigated before age of 18 & 53.0%
 African Americans (Kim et al 2017)
- South Australia: 1 in 4 reported to child protection by age 16 and "between 57 and 76 per cent" of Aboriginals Delfabbro et al. (2010)
- England children born 2009-10 before 5th birthday: 22.5% referred; 5.4% investigated; 3.5% CP plan
- Wales: ??



DOES CHILD PROTECTION PROTECT CHILDREN?

Gilbert et al. (2012a) used data in a comparison of six countries to consider trends in physical abuse and neglect in reports and outcomes focusing on children younger than eleven. Their conclusion was that:

Our results show no clear evidence for an overall decrease in child maltreatment despite decades of policies designed to achieve such reductions (Gilbert et al., 2012, p. 770).

SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT AN ALTERNATIVE PARADIGM FOR SOCIAL WORK

Key features of social development relevant to child protection are:

- Social investments that enhance capabilities including: "employment placement, childcare, adult literacy, microenterprise, and asset savings accounts" (Midgley & Conley, 2010: xii–xiv)
- Advocacy oriented to move from a narrow preoccupation with practice with families and children
- Community oriented and asset based approaches to combat social exclusion
- Strengths-basis acknowledging and focussing on family and community assets and aiming to promote resilience
- Interdisciplinary focus including promoting access to housing, medical care, education, and recreational facilities

QUESTIONS RAISED

- Does the current increasing child protection intervention reduce harm to children?
- Can early intervention be introduced helpfully without a paradigm change from our 'individualised' approach?
- What is the impact of child protection's concentration on the most deprived communities?
