How do social workers talk about poverty and how should they?

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Research question: What aspects of poverty are negotiated through talk and how?

- o 6 recordings of child protection home visits
- o English social work practice
- o Small sample size
- o Poverty defined as indicators of relative deprivation

Finding: Talk about poverty is functional and is resisted during home visits

better than most people would
M: [*this time I feel different*]
